LABOUR RESEARCH SERVICE INFLATION MONITOR JUNE 2023

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The Consumer Price Index dropped to 5.4% in June 2023

The term inflation means a sustained increase in the general level of prices of goods and services. It is measured as an annual percentage increase (for example, June 2022 to June 2023). A falling rate of inflation means that prices are rising at a slower rate.

The headline annual inflation rate decreased to 5.4% in June 2023 from 6.3% in May 2023. The Consumer Price Index (CPI) increased by 0.2% month-on-month in June 2023.

The food price declined to 11.1% in June 2023 from 12% in May 2023.

Transport inflation declined to 1.8% June 2023 from 7% in May 2023.

Public transport inflation declined to 9.7% in June 2023 from 14.2% in May 2023.

The administrator's price (school, telephone fees, electricity, trains, and petrol/paraffin) declined to 0.7% in June 2023 from 4.7% in May 2023.)




Figure 1: Consumer Price Index (CPI) and selected price categories | 2022 to June 2023

Statistics South Africa divides household monthly expenditure into 10 deciles. The table below shows that the decile 10 expenditure was higher than the decile 1 expenditure, indicating a high level of inequality.

There is more than one inflation number. Different groups of people, from the very poor to the very rich, can experience different rates of inflation because they buy different things. The very low spending group (decile 1) experienced an inflation rate of 9.1%, which was higher than the headline annualised inflation rate of 5.4%, while the very high spending group (decile 10) had an inflation rate of 4.9%, which was lower than the inflation rate of 5.4% in June 2023.






Figure 3: Annualised inflation rate (%) by province | June 2023

The provinces with annual inflation rates lower than or equal to the headline rate were Gauteng (4.9%) and North West (5.3%). The provinces with annual inflation higher than headline inflation were Western Cape (5.6%), Limpopo (5.7%), Northern Cape (5.9%), Mpumalanga (5.9%), Eastern Cape (6.2%), KwaZulu-Natal (6.5%) and Free State (7.2%).

An administered price is defined as the price of a product that is consciously set by an individual producer or group of producers and/or any price that can be set or influenced by government, either directly or through one or more government agencies/institutions, without reference to market forces. Examples include school fees, telephone charges, electricity, trains, petrol/paraffin, mobile phone calls and public transport. This rate is included in the overall CPI inflation rate.
